Chair's Blog

Dear Parishioners

Another year comes to an end with that oft heard refrain....'Where did the time go?'

In December 2023, we were exploring the idea of transforming our Parish Rooms into a facility more 'fit for purpose' and since then, a lot of design and survey work has been undertaken which has culminated in the application for planning permission being submitted. If you have any views please contact the Clerk or you can, of course, make comments direct on Cornwall Council's Planning Portal. In one sense, this is the easy bit. If permission is granted, we then have to ensure that we have a robust Business Plan to guarantee its sustainability and we then have to raise the money to fund its build. That will not be easy but sometimes you have to 'dream big.'

A year ago, we were hopeful that building work may have commenced by now on the affordable housing site at Gwennap village but the scheme has not progressed due to funding issues. Every effort is being made by the Cornwall Community Land Trust to ensure that the scheme progresses and we should know a final decision early in the New Year.

By contrast, the Trelyn development in Frogpool is moving forward. It has been the subject of public consultation and a planning application will be submitted shortly. As always, the Parish Council's role is to promote the provision of much-needed housing for local people desperate for accommodation whilst ensuring that the interests of neighbouring residents are safeguarded.

Environmental issues remain a top priority for the Council and the amalgamation of our Parish Group with those of Carharrack and St Day has given real momentum to that initiative. If this is something in which you have a particular interest, I would urge you to join and to help make a difference.

Our 'Unsung Hero' awards are returning this year so please nominate anyone you think worthy of recognition. It is a great opportunity to celebrate people who represent the best of our community. Talking of which, Lynn Begley has had to step down from the Parish Council due to other competing voluntary priorities. I thank her for 3 years of hard work and dedication.

Another 'Unsung Hero' is Lorraine Osborne who sadly passed away recently. Her last words to her best friend were, 'Go and live your life to the full.' This is a sentiment we all need to take to heart at a time of so much domestic and global uncertainty. We can't worry about what we can't control but there is still so much we can do to enrich our own lives and to help others.

Lorraine was a regular quiz organiser at the Cornish Arms with a particular favourite being Halloween and the chance for her to wear a witch's hat. Everyone at the pub knew Lorraine and she had a kind word for all.

Lorraine's passing will leave a huge gap in everybody's life but, of course, she will be missed most by Kingsley. They were the perfect partnership, always encouraging each other, laughing together and welcoming you into their lovely home for tea and comfort. Maybe none of us are saints but Lorraine came as close as anyone to that accolade and Gwennap will not be the same without her.

Hedgehogs don't have hibernation calendars!

Right now we are in early Autumn. Lots of hedgehog youngsters are around and they have plenty of time to get up to a decent weight for hibernation.

Unless there is a very good reason to take them in - out during the day, illness, injury, or an abandoned nest with hoglets, right now the best thing to do is to leave them as nature intended. They do NOT need to be brought in to be 'overwintered' just yet.

Leave food and water out where you can to help them along the way.

There is no guaranteed date that hedgehogs will hibernate, it varies year on year depending on weather conditions ans temperature. Usually this is late November/early December but this isn't an exact science!


A hedgehog under 450g will most likely not have the energy reserves to survive hibernation.

BE ALERT: When overnight temperatures are forecast to be below 5°c for at least a week ahead, there is frost & the ground is hard. At this point we would be concerned to find any hedgehogs under 600g, and bring them into the rescue for support and assessment

Affordable Housing

Frogpool update

Coastline Housing is an independent Cornish charitable Housing Association owning and managing over 5,000 homes across Cornwall. We are based in Redruth.

Coastline's aim is to end the housing crisis in Cornwall. 12% of homes in Cornwall are social homes, compared to an average of 19% across England. Private rents and house prices are unaffordable to most, trapping families in poverty.

This site was bought to Coastline for consideration earlier this year. This site benefits from an exisiting PIP PA22/09674 which means permission in principle has been approved for the delivery of up to 9 affordable homes on a Policy 9 Rural Exception site basis.

The land is to be acquired by Classic, and then Coastline will purchase the site once full planning is achieved, and Classic will build these homes out on behalf of Coastline.

Following attendance at a Parish Council meeting on the 11th September 2024, a public consultation of the plans was held on 20th November 2024 in the Gwennap Parish Hall Room between 2-7pm. 37 people attended the event along with members of the Parish Council.

Representatives from Coastline Housing, Classic Builders and the Architect were available throughout the event to answer any questions.

There are 48 households registered in housing need with Cornwall Homechoice as of 16th October 2024.

The proposal for this scheme is for 9 bungalows to be delivered as 100% affordable. These homes will be a mix of social rent and shared ownership.

Social Rent	Shared Ownership
3 x 1.5b2p bungalows	1 x 2b4p bungalow
2 x 2b4p bungalows	2 x 3b5p bungalows
1 x 3b5p bungalow	

Occupation of all these homes would legally require a local connection to Gwennap Parish. This will include neighbouring parishes but this has not yet been finally decided.

A number of comments were received during the public consultation which we will be working to address. The revised scheme will be presented at a further Parish Council meeting in due course, before the planning submission is made.

Concerns from members of the public who attended the public consultation included;

- A request to move one of the homes further away from an existing boundary
- Concern around the loss of a green field
- Ensuring all of the proposed new homes have sufficient parking provided
- Concern around streetlights being included, and a preference for low level streetlights, or no streetlights being included on this scheme
- Concern around the speed in which cars are travelling along that road, and a request for either a reduced speed limit and / or footpaths to be included
- Concern around a potential footpath link across private land shown on the plans, and the impact this may have on existing parking challenges along Treneglos.

Affordable Housing

Positive comment received from members of the public who attended the public consultation included;

- Welcome a small scheme in keeping with the village
- Welcome the proposed finished of granite and render
- Welcome affordable homes for local people
- Welcome the ecological measures being proposed ie. hedgehog highways
- Welcome the use of Air source Heat-pumps, PV panels and MVHRs to reduce the running costs of homes and more environmentally friendly
- · Welcome retaining existing hedgerows

Next steps:

Our aim is to amend the plan taking into consideration the comments received to date. Coastline will then present updated plans to the Parish Council prior to final submission of the plans.

It is hoped that a start on site, so a spade in the ground, would be secured in around Autumn 2025, with completion of the homes around 12 months later.

Gwennap Parish Rooms

Gwennap Parish Council and Marraum architects are delighted to report that the planning application for the renovation of Gwennap Parish Rooms at Richard Jory Playing Field, Pulla Cross has been submitted. This marks an exciting milestone for the community and presents a wonderful opportunity to improve and enhance the facilities of this well-loved space.

Marraum have been privileged to work on this proposal, not least because it holds a special place in the hearts of Marraum's owners, Adam and Daisy, who grew up just down the road from the playing fields. They share great memories of spending time there with friends and family, and on school outings.

The existing building, while much loved, is old and fairly tired, and the parish council has been lucky enough to obtain funding to redevelop it, turning the existing facilities into something much more versatile and inclusive.

Deciding how best to redevelop the hall has been a lengthy process, sharing ideas and consulting with the parish councillors, those who use the existing facilities and local people. Following a positive public consultation earlier this year, we gained valuable ideas that have helped shape the project into something that truly meets the community's needs.

Our proposal seeks to upgrade and extend the space, providing a two-storey building that will cater for a variety of different uses. At its core, the new Gwennap Parish Rooms will serve as a hub for the community; from a spacious hall for events and celebrations to a welcoming café with a soft play area to complement the popular outdoor play area. The design also includes meeting rooms, function spaces, and private community workspaces, making sure the building can be adapted for use by a wide range of users and for many purposes.

The needs of the local football club, a key part of the community, has been central to the design. Our proposal significantly enhances the club facilities, such as updating the changing rooms and improving the storage facilities. These upgrades will ensure that the football club has the resources it needs to thrive.

One of the most important issues highlighted during the public consultation was the need for extra parking. Match days, car boot sales, and other popular events have often been hampered by limited parking options. We have proposed additional parking spaces, which will make the site more accessible and functional for a wider range of activities.

The impact of this development on the local environment and its surroundings has been carefully considered throughout the process. Detailed assessments, such as noise impact studies and biodiversity net gain reports have been carried out, and we have worked hard to ensure the design harmonises with the local landscape, both visually and environmentally.

This project is about more than just improving a building; it's about creating a vibrant, inclusive space that brings people together and enriches community life. By addressing the needs and aspirations of local residents, we hope to leave a lasting legacy on everyone. This proposal is a step forward for the parish, one that will enhance the area and provide opportunities for people of all ages.

We hope the local community will support this planning application. Together, we can create a space that will be cherished by current and future generations. We look forward to the next stages of this journey and can't wait to see the positive impact this project will have on the community.

United Downs Racetrack

UDEG are working in partnership with Purple Cornwall Ltd, the company who run the Banger Racetrack. Together we are looking at the Green Lease requirements set by the landlord, Cornwall Council. Jointly, we are making extraordinary steps forward. One of the most exciting projects coming out of this work is the discovery of the rare and endangered flowering plants and ferns by Dr Colin French (PhD in Palaeoecology), May 2022. Colin's report identified 186 species in what looks like bleak, barren scrubland on the old mining site. It is quite the opposite! As a result, we potentially have on our doorstep a centre of natural wonders with a high level of biodiversity, presenting high nature conservation value (French, 2022). UDEG members working with Colin and Crispen, the proprietor,

have learnt so much. We humbly recognise by listening, learning and reflecting from these people offers very different results to what we first expected. Thank You Dr French and Crispen Rosevear. Peat-Free Compost - A sell out success!

We have come to the end of another busy year with the peat-free compost refill station. This year, we have joined up these sessions with the Carharrack Monthly Market, which takes place on the second Saturday of every month at the Mills Hall, Carharrack and this has proved to be an great success. What gardener doesn't want to top-up with extra vegetables, delicious bread and cakes, supplies from Incredible Bulk and have all their garden implements expertly sharpened by Zoltan the Knife Sharpener? Our wonderful 'black gold' compost, supplied by The Green Waste Company of St Erth, was on sale from February to June, and again in September and October. Every session was a sell-out - often at a rate that kept our amazing team of bag fillers shovelling at break-neck speed. We are delighted that so many of you are using this excellent compost for your gardens and by returning the heavy-duty blue bags for refilling, are cutting down the number of plastic bags going to waste - one of the key aims of this scheme. For the last few years, we have managed to keep the cost to £4 for a new filled bag, and £2 for a refill. Unfortunately, due to the increased cost of both the compost and the bags, from February 2025, the cost of a new filled bag will be £5. The cost of a refill will, however, be kept at £2 to encourage return and refill. This price still compares very favourably with the cost of peat-free compost from mainstream suppliers and has the added advantage of being locally produced and of a very high quality. Dates for 2025 are: 8th February, 8th March, 12th April, 10th May, 14th June, 13th September and 11th October. We hope to see you there!

Pond life! A Frogpool and Cusgarne FC story.

Long has it been widely accepted that the Cornish football leagues are subject to more changes than a conservative government cabinet reshuffle, however Frogpool and Cusgarne Football club have always largely bucked that trend. They've been blessed with a pride of long standing players, who have shared a real passion for community when representing our parish on the field of play!

Over the last two seasons the inevitable reshuffles have been none more apparent than down at Richard Jory playing field, with long time servants stepping down or hanging up their boots to make way for a young and hungry manager in the form of Alex Leah.

Alex cut his teeth in football management previously in division two with a Mount Ambrose team, and now with the help of Ben Lavell, a Cornish football league expert and legend, they are looking to cement their own chapter in Frogpool Footballing history.

After carefully curating a new reserve team squad for the 2023/24 season, a team mixed with experience and youthful exuberance, they entered at the foot of division four to support and feed the established first team squad.

After a strong start, a number of injuries in key positions coupled with the horrendous Cornish weather in the early months of 2024 put paid to any momentum for a promotion charge, and they finished a very average 6th in division four.



BOOZY CHRISTMAS PUDDING TRIFLE

I am an unapologetic lover of trifle. There is something about a large dollop of that soft, sweet traditional dessert splodging into a bowl that is totally irresistible. I especially like it if it has some contrasting crunchiness on top in the form of toasted or caramelised almonds and shards of chocolate and, of course, a large glug of alcohol is essential. In the run-up to Christmas last year I was pondering what to do with a very nice Christmas pudding that we had been given. As I had already made ours I wanted to make something with our gift that was simple to construct and delicious so I came up with the idea of this trifle. We tried it out and I am slightly ashamed to say that between Mr H and myself we managed to demolish the whole thing over the course of the festive period.

I haven't given quantities as I leave it down to you to decide what size of trifle you want depending on the numbers you are catering for.

Large glass or china trifle bowl

Christmas pudding
Pineapple chunks, drained if tinned
Brandy
Custard – homemade or shop-bought
Double or whipping cream
Toppings of your choice:
chocolate shards,
almonds (toasted or caramelised),
edible glitter for sparkle



Put the Christmas pudding in a microwaveable bowl and heat it gently until just warm and soft. Break it up with a spoon or fork.

Cut the pineapple chunks up into smaller pieces and add them to the pudding. Mix well.

Add as much brandy as you want to suit your taste.

Place the pudding in the bottom of your trifle dish. Pour the custard over the top.

Whip the cream until it <u>just</u> holds it shape. Double cream is always more tricky than whipping as it quickly changes from smooth to a solid granular texture. It will thicken as you spoon it over the custard.

Add your preferred toppings and voila! A truly Christmassy dessert with very little effort.
